Sex Trafficking is defined as: "the use of tricks, manipulation or physical force to make a person provide sex in exchange for shelter, protection, money, food, basic needs, love, adventure, gifts and love of family".

Sex Trafficking is on the rise right here in Wisconsin, and horrifyingly, our state has become a trafficking 'Corridor".

5-Stones provides educational training, awareness and prevention handouts, presentations and tangible answers as to what to do for adults and children. They even have billboards along the heavily trafficked highways! Their website offers videos and art geared toward teens that help them see the dangers lurking right in their back yards.
