My Dear Sisters in Christ,

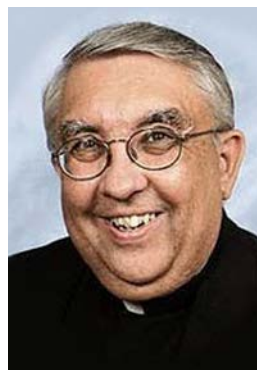

As we continue with our 2021-2022 MDCCW year, I hope that you include one or more service projects in your council's activities. If you have not already done

so, plan your meetings throughout the year to a particular theme and then plan your service projects as well.

Boxes of Joy. In 2020, we sent 750 Boxes of Joy to children in Latin American countries. In 2021, we had a 20 percent increase in boxes sent to Cross Catholic Outreach for a total of 896. All Saints Parish, Berlin, sent 200 boxes, and 696 were sent from St. Peter Church, Ashton. Thank you to volunteers Ellen Dargel, Pam Putman, Audrey McKnight, Linda Ripp, Diane Pillsbury, Sue Barker, Michelle LeVeque, and another unidentified helper from Madison who helped pack the boxes at St. Peter. Thanks also to All Saints volunteers.

Walking With Moms in Need (WWMiN): The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) selected this project to serve pregnant and parenting women. Everyone should know how to help moms in difficult circumstances. While not trying to turn Catholic parishes into pregnancy centers, we can support local pregnancy centers where they exist, and we can also find and share other resources with pregnant and parenting women.

The Diocese of Madison introduced this project last October at Holy Name Heights to representatives from more than 17 diocesan parishes. Bishop Donald J. Hying participated in the meeting and celebrated Mass.

Following that initial meeting and training session, the Diocese has offered more training opportunities to provide parishes with "the tools to become reliable connectors to local resources and partners in filling service gaps."

Carol and her husband Dick are members of Queen of All Saints Parish, Fennimore, and the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem and as such have pledged to support the sacred sites in the Holy Land. Carol serves on her parish council, is a sacristan, and chairs the evangelism team. She holds leadership positions with the Grant Vicariate CCW. Carol's blended family includes eight adult children, thirteen grandchildren, and three great grandchildren.

2022 Convention Speaker



SUSAN HILLIARD

Susan Hilliard, the volunteer caretaker of the National Shrine of St. Philomena, in Briggsville, will speak after lunch at the convention. She will talk about the life of St. Philomena and her work as the caretaker of the shrine.

Pleased to be asked to speak at the convention, Susan said, “Many people have no knowledge of this little teenage saint who had much faith and was tragically murdered. I will also share my life experiences taking care of her. Remember, she is always listening.”

For the last 24 years, Susan has taken care of everything that has to do with the outdoor shrine. She sends sacramentals all over the United States, greets visitors to the shrine, give talks on St. Philomena, maintains the shrine, and takes all the prayer requests that come from all around the world. She also sets up the Mass schedule for the three feast days celebrated on January 10, May 25, and August 10.

Susan also holds a position on the executive board of the Universal Archconfraternity of St. Philomena in Mugnano del Cardinale, Italy, where the saint’s remains are. She works with centers in the United States and in some English-speaking parts of Canada.

The Briggsville shrine to St. Philomena was started in 1949 and includes a first-class relic of the “Little Virgin Martyr.”
